HOMELAND WELCOME



DORIS FOX is a Musqueam Elder. Throughout the year, Doris works at different wellness days as a life coach, spiritual advisor, and healer using various traditional healing methods taught to her by Elders and by various other Indigenous healers. Doris sits on several advisory boards, committees, Elders Circles, etc. As well, Doris works at several health clinics as an Elder and healer.

Doris teaches various traditional arts and crafts such as, traditional Salish weaving, cedar-bark weaving, beading, etc., that were taught to her by her Elders. During her classes, Doris ensures that the students know about the history, traditions, values, and beliefs behind the ancient knowledge that she shares. Doris also shares her knowledge of intellectual property and the importance of artists knowing how to protect themselves and their work. Doris is an artist and clothing designer, as well, and has taught sewing classes.

MICHELLE ELIOT is an award-winning journalist and the host of CBC British Columbia's weekday call-in show, BC Today, where she engages in conversation with listeners on the day's top stories and on issues important to British Columbians.

Eliot has hosted numerous CBC news specials, including tapping into her Filipino heritage as part of CBC's Mabuhay B.C., an ongoing initiative to share stories from the province's Filipino

community. Eliot has been recognized by the Radio Television Digital News Association and the Jack Webster Foundation for stories that delved into the opioid crisis in BC, the immigrant experience in Canada, and for coverage of the 2017 NDP-Green deal for a minority government in BC.

Active in the community, Eliot has hosted numerous events and forums, including discussions on proportional representation, basic income, costs of caregiving, and anxiety and motherhood. As a parent of a child with special needs, Eliot also participates in events in the disability community.

KEYNOTE



DR. PAM PALMATER is an internationally renowned speaker, award-winning Indigenous podcaster, prolific author, and social justice activist driving reconciliation with Indigenous peoples. With four degrees, including a doctorate in law focusing on Indigenous rights, Pam helps change academia as Professor and Chair in Indigenous Governance at Toronto Metropolitan University.

A Mi'kmaw Nation citizen and member of Eel River Bar First Nation, she champions social justice and educates people about Indigenous rights so they can push for meaningful changes to Canadian laws and policies. As a practicing lawyer for over two decades and an expert in Indigenous law, she testifies before United Nations treaty bodies, Parliamentary committees, and inquiries like Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG), and the most recent Nova Scotia Mass Casualty Commission.

Considered one of the Top 25 Movers and Shakers by the Financial Post, Pam's 200+ publications on Indigenous issues and human rights are shaping a path towards social justice and climate action.

ABOUT WEST COAST LEAF

West Coast LEAF envisions an equitable and just society for all women and people who experience gender-based discrimination. We are committed to an inclusive and intersectional vision of feminism that includes women, Two-Spirit people, intersex people, gender-non-conforming people, trans people of all genders, and people with non-binary gender identities.

We recognize that we do this work in the context of historic and ongoing colonial violence and injustice, and we are committed to working for the full realization of the rights of Indigenous peoples.

We respectfully acknowledge that our organization is located on traditional, ancestral, and unceded Coast Salish homelands, including the territories of the xwma0kwajam (Musqueam), Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), and səlílwəta74 / Selilwitulh (Tsleil-Waututh) Nations. As an organization that includes many settlers, we take responsibility for learning and seeking long-term transformation in our relationships with Indigenous peoples and the land.

West Coast LEAF promotes substantive equality, an approach that recognizes and celebrates differences. Rather than treating everyone the same, substantive equality ensures that historically disadvantaged people can actively participate in society and access justice. We strive to ensure that the equality principles in the *Charter of Rights and Freedoms*, which advance the rights of all disadvantaged and marginalized groups, are fulfilled.

OUR BEGINNINGS

West Coast LEAF came out of the desire of feminist activists, lawyers, and academics to ensure that the newly drafted equality provisions of the *Charter of Rights and Freedoms* were robustly interpreted and applied through the courts. Our founders'

vision was to combat sex- and gender-based discrimination by mobilizing the law as a catalyst for broader social change.

Since our founding in 1985, we have helped bring about some of Canada's most important feminist victories for reproductive rights, workplace standards, fairness in family law, access to justice, legal protections from sexual harassment, and more. Working collaboratively with community, we use litigation, law reform, and public legal education to create transformative change.

We are proud of our humble beginnings—our first "office" was a filing cabinet outside the doors of Lynn Smith's office at UBC's then Faculty of Law and board meetings were held at her dining room table. Now, nearly four decades later, we are a well-respected and sought-after national voice advocating for gender equality and justice.

A HUGE VICTORY FOR SINGLE MOTHERS!

On February 15, 2024, West Coast LEAF, representing the plaintiff Centre for Family Equity (formerly known as the Single Mothers' Alliance), reached a settlement with the Province of BC and Legal Aid BC (LABC) after a nearly seven-year constitutional challenge. Finally, lone parents navigating family violence will get more of the legal aid services they urgently need.

More than 20 years ago, the provincial government cut legal aid funding for family law by 60 per cent. This meant that survivors of family violence, who are overwhelmingly women and often single mothers, faced far too many barriers to escaping abuse and vindicating their rights in family law cases that dragged on and on, becoming more complex and difficult over time.

This milestone is the result of years-long persistence in a belief that people navigating the family justice system while at their most vulnerable should not be left alone without legal support.

West Coast LEAF started this case in 2017 in partnership with Centre for Family Equity (CFE), two courageous and remarkable individual plaintiffs, and countless others behind the scenes who have been steadfast in their vision for an equitable, safe, and accessible justice system for those leaving family violence.

The settlement from this case will replace a one-size-fits-all model of family law legal aid with robust, multidimensional, and

sustained services. The solutions offered by this exciting new tier of services will make the family law legal aid system more responsive to the on-the-ground realities of survivors and better able to meet survivors' complex legal needs.

This settlement will replace a onesize-fits-all model of family law legal aid with robust, multidimensional, and sustained services.

This outcome shows us a new way forward for family law legal services, but it also highlights the impact of collective action. Advocacy efforts — including litigation — can be important strategies for seeking meaningful change and improving outcomes for people in our province. When we come together in support of those whose needs are not being met, we help create a more equitable society for all.
